#### **ADVENT MEANINGS**

During Advent, which begins this year on December 3, many churches and families use wreaths to symbolize watchfulness and increasing joy as Christmas approaches. Colors for the candles vary, with some traditions using blue (for hope or creation) and others preferring purple (for royalty, humility or penitence).

The four candles that each represent a week in Advent also signify hope, peace, joy and love. (The third candle is often pink.) In the center is the white Christ candle, representing Jesus as the light of the world. That candle is lit on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.

The round, green Advent wreath has special meaning of its own. It symbolizes eternal life and the unending love of God, who sent his only Son to earth to die in our place.

#### "LET THERE BE PEACE ON EARTH" by Sy Miller and Jill Jackson

With all that has been happening in our world lately, we felt it appropriate to sing this hymn during our worship service. So, on Sunday, November 5, 2023, we sang the hymn "Let There Be Peace on Earth". Did you ever wonder when and how this hymn originated? Why was this hymn written and by whom?

Let there be peace on earth And let it begin with me; Let there be peace on earth, The peace that was meant to be.

With God as our Father, Brothers all are we. Let me walk with my brother In perfect harmony. Let peace begin with me, Let this be the moment now. With ev'ry step I take, Let this be my solemn vow.

To take each moment and live each moment In peace eternally. Let there be peace on earth And let it begin with me.

One summer evening in 1955, a group of 180 teenagers of all races and religions, meeting at a workshop high in the California mountains locked arms, formed a circle and sang a song of peace. They felt that singing the song, with its simple basic sentiment—"Let there be peace on earth, and let it begin with me," helped to create a climate for world peace and understanding.

When they came down from the mountain, these inspired young people brought the song with them and started sharing it. And, as though on wings, "Let There Be Peace on Earth" began an amazing journey around the globe. It traveled first, of course with the young campers back to their homes and schools, churches and clubs. Then the circle started by the teenagers began to grow. Soon the song was being shared in all fifty states—at school graduations and at PTA meetings, at Christmas and Easter gatherings and as part of the celebration of Brotherhood Week. It was a theme for Veteran's Day, Human Rights Day and U. N. Day. 4H Clubs and the United Auto Workers began singing it. So did the American Legion, the B'nai B'rith, the Kiwanis Clubs and CORE. It was taped, recorded, copied, printed in song books, and passed by word of mouth.

The song spread overseas to Holland, England, France, Germany, Lebanon. To South America, Asia and Australia. The Maois in New Zealand sang it—even the Zulus in Africa sang it.

Professional singers took it up. Among them, Ernie Ford, Andy Williams, Danny Kaye, Nat Cole, the Smothers Brothers, Roy Rogers, Dale Evans, Eddie Albert, Edie Adams, John Gary, Pearl Bailey, Roberta Shore, Champ Butler, the King Sisters, Mary Tyler Moore, John Raitt, Robie Lester, Liberace, Bob Crosby, the International Children's Choir, Jack Halloran, Gisele MacKenzie, Richard Summers, Lloyd Bridges, Patti Page, Angela Cartwright, the Young Americans, Carole Wells, Jack Smith, Pat Boone, Johnny Mathis, Rhonda Fleming, Stan Melton, Norman Luboff, Bing Crosby, Bob Hope, Lorne Greene, and Ted Mack TV shows, and Father Keller's Christopher TV series.

The song began to win awards. "Let There Be Peace on Earth" was awarded the George Washington Honor Medal by the Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge for "Outstanding achievement in helping to bring about a better understanding of the American Way of Life." It also received a Brotherhood Award from the National Conference of Christians and Jews.

This simple thought, "Let There Be Peace on Earth, and Let it Begin with Me" first born on a mountain top in the voices of youth, continues to travel heart to heart—gathering in people everywhere who wish to become a note in a song of understanding and peace—peace for all mankind.

## BERN LUTHERAN CHURCH 25<sup>TH</sup> ANNIVERSARY OF CHURCH BUILDING Sunday, November 12, 2023

The following is Pastor Kenneth Gould's Sermon from our anniversary worship service on Sunday, November 12, 2023. If you were not able to attend this service, we thought it would be nice to share Pastor Gould's sermon with you.

There is a popular song from 1955 which some of you likely remember. I was only 6 years old when that song first appeared, and while I don't recall it from then, it was recorded by a number of other groups since that year. It is called "Moments to Remember." It's refrain, so to speak goes like this, "When other nights and other days may find us gone our separate ways, we will have these moments to remember." Moments to remember—many of you have been members of this congregation all your life, you have moments to remember; some of you have generations of your family that anchor you to this church. Others, like me, are new to Bern Church membership, but I hope you still have moments to remember. Some of you may also remember from your past experiences here, recollections of this church's history. We certainly cannot bring to mind all that has happened in the life of Bern Church but let us recall the earliest history.

Bern Lutheran Church was formed in 1836. History tells us that it was in the winter of that year that a group of German Lutherans in Bern and neighboring Penn Township started Bern Church. It seems that the idea to form a congregation for Lutherans did not spring up in just a few months. German Reformed records indicate that there were baptisms from at least as early as 1739, and so in 1836, the German Bern Reformed already in existence, organized a union church with the Bern Lutherans joining in 1837 with the building of the third church on the same site where the Bern UCC building now exists.

What was happening in the world that was vastly different from what we know now? Here are a few highlights from 1836: from February 23 until March 6 the Battle of the Alamo raged in Texas. On June 15 Arkansas became the 25<sup>th</sup> state in the union. On July 1 James Smithson bequested money to found the Smithsonian Institute which is still in existence as our country's national museum. On December 7 Martin Van Buren was declared the 8<sup>th</sup> President of the United States. Those are just a few highlights.

Arrangements between the Bern Lutherans and the Bern Reformed seemed to have gone on with few if any differences recorded. The fourth Bern Church building, the one currently in existence, was erected in 1919 and is used by the UCC's. After all, by then the people had intermarried and the difference between Lutherans and Reformed theology had become less important to the average lay person. There were more important things to be concerned about in daily life. The stock market crash, the Great Depression, World War II were all part of the experience in Bern Township just as they were around the country and indeed the world. Indeed, as we entered the 1980's and 1990's, church life became less of a priority. And then the daring 1990's arrived. What was happening in the 90's? Specifically, what was happening in 1998, the year that this building was built? Here are just a few highlights.

On January 4, 1998, there was a massive ice storm across North America. I imagine most people in this area took it as they did other winter storms; they dealt with it as they did with other winter storms. As one of my church members would say of such things: "The Father put it there and the SUN will take it away!" On February 28 the War in Kosovo began. On April 10 the Northern Ireland Good Friday agreement was signed, which actually ended warfare and murder in Great Britain. On May 7 Mercedes Benz bought the Chrysler Corporation for \$40 billion. On June 5 an AUW strike began that lasted 5 weeks. On December 1 Exxon Mobil was created for \$73.7 billion making it the world's largest corporation. And on November 22, 1998, you dedicated this building. Bern Lutheran Church was dedicated with the Rev. James Wolford serving as Presiding Minister. Many of the same people involved then in the church's ministry are still involved today. I will not begin to name them. Many of you know them, and we heartily thank them for their dedication and continued involvement. If they had not had a vision and a commitment, what you experience every Sunday when you come for worship would not exist. But did you know these things about this wonderful building? It is 12,900 square feet, in the shape of a cross, the sanctuary can seat 220, the architect and builder was Arthur Funk & Sons of Lebanon, the building in 1998 was valued at \$1 million and the furnishings at \$400,000. The Interim Pastor at the time of the Dedication Service was Pastor Donald Beck. The church council president was Michael Werley, and the building committee chairman was Elwood Speicher.

Much more than that, I'll tell you in a minute, although I am sure documentation exists somewhere in the church's minutes. But take time to look around and marvel at the wonder that is here, but then don't stop there. Think of the services that have taken place here, of the ministries continued after, during and now in this place. All of that is important and we should never lose track of the importance of a congregation's church building. But then also pause to remember that this building is important because of what happens here, because of the people who devote their time, talent, and treasure to make it happen. Buildings, church buildings are important. They become the social center of the people of the congregation who first and foremost come here to hear God's word preached and the sacrament celebrated. That is the focus of the church according to the Augsburg Confession, one of the documents which since June 25, 1530, have defined what the church is foremost and what Lutherans have always used as the definition of what a Christian church is. We don't put much attention to that anymore it seems, but throughout its history, the Lutheran Church around the world has!!

So we come here, first to hear the Word and to receive Baptism and Holy Communion. To be sure a lot more happens here and in any other church, but that is what this church was built for. But that fact that those things happen here, is because there are people, the baptized people of God, who have come together as a community that gives this building meaning. We cannot lose sight of that dream. You are the people of God, established in this place, in this beautiful and serviceable building to hear God's Word, to receive the Sacraments, to worship and adore He who is the Lord and Savior of the whole world and to carry that message to the world in whatever way God provides you. May you continue to be faithful to that calling and may you be assured that God is with you each day of life and unto eternal life. Amen.

## BERN LUTHERAN CHURCH HISTORY (How It All Began)

We are not sure if this history was written by the late Terry Van Lear, so if anyone knows definitely who wrote it, please let the church office know. Thank you!

This all started in 1992, when one of our members (Robert Egan) named us in his will. We were to receive a bequest from his will, but we had to meet one of the following three conditions:

- 1. Merge the two congregations into one Lutheran congregation;
- 2. The Lutheran congregation buy out the UCC congregation and we stay and they leave and build; or
- 3. The UCC congregation buy out the Lutheran congregation and they stay and we leave and build a new church;

or we could do none of the above and remain a union church. We had ten years to decide or the money would go to maintain historical buildings in Berks County.

Many meetings were held, formal, informal, and parking lot meetings to discuss the pros and cons of the three conditions. The UCC congregation helped us make a decision. They didn't want to lose their identity, and since they were the first congregation at Bern, they wanted to remain. Thus, we could remain as we were or leave and build a new church.

The decision was made to build a new church, but there were four obstacles standing in our way.

- 1. We didn't own any land to build a new church.
- 2. We had no plans or idea of what type of building we wanted.
- 3. We didn't have a contractor to build the church.
- 4. There wasn't much money to pay for this project.

We started with faith and the belief that "with the help of God anything is possible." We started looking at what had to be done to overcome these four obstacles.

On October 1, 1995, we held a Building Fund Kick-Off Dinner and adopted the motto – "To Give –To Build–To Grow into the 21st Century." A Building Committee and a Dissolution Committee were formed. The Dissolution Committee was to negotiate the terms for dissolution. The Building Committee started the following:

- 1. Search for land along the 183 corridor;
- 2. Search for a contractor, by interviewing contractors with church building expertise; and
- 3. Search for plans of the type of building we wanted

We traveled to many fairly new churches in Berks, Bucks, Chester, Lancaster, and Schuylkill counties. We got a lot of good ideas but, when we put them all together, we knew we couldn't afford the building.

Then one of our members, the late Warren Lengel, suggested we go see a new Lutheran church in Gordon, PA. On our first visit there, I think, many of us decided this was the basic design we were looking for. Several more trips were made to Gordon with other members until the decision was made to go with this basic design—the shape of a cross. One obstacle solved.

Next, we decided on Arthur Funk & Sons as our design builder. This turned out to be a good choice. Second obstacle solved. We then started working on designing the interior to meet our needs.

On April 1997, the dissolution vote was taken by both congregations, with an 80% approval.

On July 31, 1997, we held a joint Dissolution Service with the signing of the agreement.

The search for land continued. Several sites were considered. About this time, West Ridge Development started to develop the Hettinger Farm. We looked at several locations in their plans. At that time, we were looking for about five acres of land. We finally agreed on the area where this church is built, but the grove area was not part of the five acres. Some of our members thought we should have a grove.

October 29, 1997 we signed an agreement to purchase 7.43 acres which included the grove and holding pond. Third obstacle solved.

A ground-breaking ceremony was held on March 1, 1998. We had an old plow and a team of horses supplied by Harry O'Neil. The project was underway and building started soon thereafter. During the building process you could see Dave Braucher and his trusty bulldozer moving ground. For the longest time I wasn't sure what he was doing. One day he moved ground from point A to point B. The next day he seemed to be moving ground from point B to point A, but the finished product proved he did know what he was doing. Good job, Dave!

In 1998, Easter Dawn Services were held at the new church location. It was a very cold morning. On August 23, 1998, the first service was held at the unfinished church—everybody brought lawn chairs—and we placed the date stone at the entrance of the church.

On November 1, 1998, the last joint service was held in the old church.

On November 8, 1998, the first service was held in our new church.


On November 22, 1998, we held a Dedication Service.

The total cost of this project was just under 1.4 million dollars. Our debt on November 1, 1998 was \$300,000.00 with Leesport Bank and \$63,000.00 in member loans.

Today, we complete obstacle four. We celebrate the retirement of this debt—five years from the date of ground-breaking. Thanks to all of you and thank God and our faith and belief that "with the help of God anything is possible."




#### What you need:


- A strand of Christmas lights

#### What you do:


- 1. Plug in the lights and place them in the container.

# Young Adult in Global Mission: A Year in Senegal Asalaa maalekum. May God's peace be upon you.

My name is Quentin Bernhard. I recently served with the ELCA program Young Adults in Global Mission—YAGM—in Senegal. My time with YAGM came to an end in July, and Senegal country cohort peers and I returned to the United States. We are among the 23 young adults from the 2022-2023 year who served in accompaniment in four different country programs.

I live in New Tripoli in Lehigh County, and I'm a member of New Life Lutheran Church in New Tripoli. Many individuals and congregations from our synod supported me in my YAGM year. Thank you for your support of my time in Senegal and for the opportunity to be in continuing relationship after my time abroad.

My coming to the United States, to the communities I grew up in in Pennsylvania, was also my leaving a community I grew in—a community I grew in as a Lutheran and as a young person, one I have good friends in. I lived in Yeumbeul Bene Baraque, in western Senegal, for ten months. I lived with a host family in a community. I saw friends every day, many when at my placement site. Connected with our partner organization Senegalese Lutheran Development Services—SLDS—I worked in a community center that serves the community in numerous ways, splitting my time between the library and the mutual fund credit union.

My friends and family in Senegal continue to send me voice messages, reminding me that I am also Maguette Ndiaye, my Senegalese name, and reminding me that we are still connected, even if connected in a different way now. Our relationships and our future—all of our future—is unknown to us. Our faith—and our trust in one another—can allow us to take steps and leaps in that future.


